The literary magazine *Alekton* takes its name from the Ancient Greek word ἀλῆκτον (álēkton), meaning "unceasing" or "without end." The title expresses the enduring nature of literature and the continuous dialogue between writers, readers, and culture across generations.

The story of *Alekton* is therefore more than the history of a publication.
